During this time of year, we would like to thank all of our veterans for their service to our country and extend our appreciation to our military members and their families who continue to sacrifice for our freedom. We are truly thankful for your dedication and commitment.

If you mail packages to troops overseas, the American Forces Press Service reports that the U.S. Postal Service will stop accepting mail addressed to military post offices in Iraq after November 17th because U.S. forces are scheduled to come home from Iraq by the end of the year. Mail still in the postal system through Nov. 17th will be processed and delivered to service members in Iraq. Any mail mistakenly accepted by the post office after Nov. 17 will be returned to

the sender once it reaches the International Gateway in New Jersey. According to defense officials, conditions and situations in the Iraq transition change often. Officials recommend checking the USPS Postal Bulletins frequently for updates.

In November/December, Headquarters will be mailing Unit Annual Report forms and Contest & Awards information to Unit Presidents; National and Department scholarship applications to Unit Presidents and Wisconsin high schools; and Badger Girls State reservation forms and program information to Unit BGS chairmen and Wisconsin high schools. Contact your Unit President or download the information from our website (www.amlegionauxwi.org). Please pay attention to all of the deadlines.

December 31, 2011 is the last day for processing 2011 PUFL applications. Any PUFL applications received after that date will need to pay their 2012 dues before De-

partment Headquarters can process them.

The Auxiliary will be hosting a luncheon during The American Legion Mid Winter Conference at Ho-Chunk on Saturday, January 21, 2012, at 12:00 noon. Advance reservations are required. The ALA Mid-Winter Luncheon Registration Form, which is due January 4, 2012 is included in this publication and available on the Department website.

I would like to thank everyone who provided guidance and advice during my first year as your Department Secretary. Member Rights: Look In Constitution and Bylaws

Constitution and Bylaws sounds like a boring subject, right? But you can make it interesting by challenging yourself or another member, or even the entire unit, by testing to see how much you really know about them. You may find this entertaining while you learn about your rights as a unit member.

A quiz given at the Fall Forum revealed that many people are unfamiliar with Department bylaws. Most did not know that the Department President and Vice President are elected by majority while other officers are elected by plurality. Many did not know a quorum at convention is seven or more districts, and that an officer need not be installed before assuming her duties. But most knew that an amendment requires a 2/3 vote and that a post may not request revocation of a unit charter. They also knew that a unit may not refuse the renewal of an unpopular member or set limits on a member before she seeks office.

You should know what officers are allowed in your unit and what their duties are. When are they elected, and for how long? You may want to run for an office and have the right to know these pertinent facts. Another important issue is that of unit membership dues. All members have a right to participate in that decision. It is important for all members to know when meetings are held so they may participate. Do you have an executive committee? What are the quorums for a regular meeting and an executive committee meeting? Your bylaws will be a substitute for Robert's Rules of Order on issues such as quorum.

Because these issues are so important to the functioning of the unit, they are part of bylaws, requiring prior notice and a 2/3 vote for adoption of amendments. When they are amended, they are to be filed with Department Headquarters for reference in case of future difficulties in the unit or for replacement of lost unit bylaws.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Verona Hamilton (Brueggeman) of Appleton Unit 38 will celebrate her 103rd birthday on December 13th. She has been a proud member of the American Legion Auxiliary for more than forty years. Verona and her husband Hugo Brueggeman had two sons, David and James. After Hugo passed away, she married George Hamilton of Appleton. Verona's sons both served in the military. David served with the Wisconsin 32nd Division during the Berlin Crisis and James with the US Navy on conventional and nuclear submarines. She became a Gold Star Mother after the loss of James on the nuclear submarine USS Scorpion in 1968. Verona's continued membership in the American Legion Auxiliary exemplifies how she "honors their service."

Making Connections Women to Women Homeless Women's Grant Fund

Thank you for your donations to the Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary – Homeless Women Veterans Grant Fund. Your ongoing support will assure that the Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary continues to honor the service of Wisconsin women Veterans, provide support and hope as they struggle to find peace and security. To date, you have made a difference in the lives of 20 women Veterans who were homeless or at-risk of being homeless.

The Homeless Women Veterans Fund has expensed over \$25,000 for the benefit of homeless women Veterans in Wisconsin who lived in their car, received eviction notices, had temporary interruption of income, purchased household furnishings as they take another step to independent living by moving into permanent housing, paid storage rent for their household and personal items while they are patients at VA Medical Centers, paid security deposits and first months rent for those transitioning from VA housing and in-patient care to independent living.

The 2010 Annual Homeless Report to Congress estimated 144,842 Veterans were at some point during the year in emergency shelters, transitional housing or unsheltered. Wisconsin reports estimate that on a single night in January, 609 Veterans were homeless (living in emergency shelter, transitional housing or unsheltered). 48 were women and 12 were households with children. **"No Veteran should have to sleep on the streets they fought to protect."** VA Assistant Secretary Tammy Duckworth.

Homeless Women Veterans are younger than their male counterparts, have lower incomes in their civilian jobs, experience high rates of unemployment (16% higher than male veterans and double that of non-veterans). 40% of homeless women Veterans have reported experiences of military sexual trauma and majority suffer post traumatic stress.

Guest Speaker: Dr. Barbara Phillips

Dr. Barbara A. Phillips, Biological Psychologist, has been recognized as one of the top 14 members in her field. For the past eight years, she has led a team of five Psychology Specialists and two Astrobiologists at NASA's Shuttle and International Space Station. Dr. Phillips demonstrates leadership and excellence. She has suffered from breast cancer and a severe form of leukemia over the course of her professional studies. She donated her body to leukemia research programs and continues to participate in their studies, despite her illness. As an intern, she visited veterans' hospitals for amputees arriving from Iraq and maintained a professional practice.

A graduate of the University of Green Bay, she earned a liberal arts degree with an emphasis in Psychology, a Ph.D. in Biological Psychology, Managerial Systems and Research Specialist from the University Consortium of the University of Wisconsin, Columbia University and Cambridge University. She assisted in writing the handbook for the textbook, "The Leadership Challenge." She was also employed as a Senior Accountant for Christensen, Roland and Johnson, CPA's as well as Enstrom Helicopter.
