I believe we should have no higher priority than investing in our children's classrooms and in their future." – Bob Riley This quote has taken to new heights in the River Falls community

This quote has taken to new heights in the River Falls community with their "Tools for Schools" event. How was "Tools for Schools" started? Many years ago, there was a crayon crisis in the River Falls community. Many students didn't have the ability to get all the school supplies needed. Volunteers started noticing this at a Tuesday night banquet which is a free church driven meal. Volunteers at that time, thirty years ago, started leaving school supplies on the tables for the kids to take. It has now morphed into this huge event that takes place the third week of August. All the children in River Falls have the opportunity, if they're in need, to participate.





What is given at this great event are school supplies that are needed specifically for their classroom. They get fitted for a new pair of shoes with socks which are donated from a local bank and a brand-new backpack, which is so important, as it needs to last the year. A local dentist hands out toothbrushes and toothpaste and the River Falls Rotary gives a new reading book at grade level for each student. After all that, each student and their family are provided with a sack lunch which contains a sandwich, a bag of chips, and a granola bar. There are also salads made up if they don't like sandwiches, fresh fruit, juice and water.

This year, "Tools for Schools" served 422 children and 100 volunteers made it all possible. This is just one way we can invest in our children's futures.

## PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY

Past Presidents Parley (PPP) is a unique group of highly qualified ALA members who dedicate their talents, experience, and leadership abilities after their service as a President at any level of the American Legion Auxiliary to mentor other members. These Past Presidents continue to promote and foster strong leadership for the future success of our premiere organization.

Sharing wisdom and knowledge can make a difference in mentoring a member, even if for just one member. Eligibility in the PPP is simple – serve one year as president at the unit, county, district, department, or national level and pay the current year's PPP dues. Members who initially started as vice president but needed to fulfill part of the president's term due to resignation or death, are also eligible to join the PPP. Presidents serving a second term are eligible to join the PPP after completion of their first year in office.

We need to increase PPP membership to achieve the primary goal of the PPP – offering three scholarships in nursing or healthcare fields. PPP membership has been falling so the PPP increased PPP dues to \$7 per year which is still reasonable to guarantee and accomplish the purpose of the PPP. Recruit those presidents who aren't aware they are eligible and encourage them to join the PPP!!

The Mentor of the Year Award was presented for the first time at the 2023 Department Convention to Jan Pulvermacher-Ryan. The PPP values its outstanding members and their devotion to values of the PPP so please nominate the next Mentor of the Year!

It is suggested that units have a Cavalcade of Memories to preserve the history of the unit to display and share with others. If you visit Department Headquarters in Portage, look over the Past Department Presidents' Cavalcade of Memories in the Legion Museum – it's a beautiful tribute to those who served the American Legion Auxiliary wholeheartedly.

The purpose of the Community Service program is to promote the American Legion Auxiliary's commitment to making our communities better places to live by supporting local service projects.

This year the focus is to promote American Legion Family Day on April 27, 2024. Posts are encouraged to open their doors to members. of their community for them to recognize and celebrate the accomplishments of Legionnaires, Sons of the American Legion members, Legion Riders, and American Legion Auxiliary to bring awareness to the organization's "Be the One" initiative to reduce the rate of Veteran suicide. As a Legion Family, gather ideas on what your post can do. Focus on planning things for children of all ages. Spread the word on the date/time/place you have set for this. Post it on social media.

Develop a plan and implement community service activities that aid Veterans, active duty servicemembers, and their families. Promote economic security for Veterans, the military, their families, and homeless Veterans while encouraging the public to assist in this endeavor.

It is important to record your community service hours. See what works best in your unit. It may be done by documenting in a unit folder each month or doc- Laura Calteux umenting on your own volunteer hour-tracking sheet. This is a wonderful way to assist in yearend reports. An hour here and an hour there adds up.

Ask yourself two simple questions and discuss them within your units: "What can we do as a group to make our programs more successful?" and "What new and creative ways can we promote our program?" Listen to all program suggestions. Do not be afraid to think out of the box and leave your comfort zone, of our Veterans! and of course, keep doing what works best for you. Invite members from the community to assist in fundraisers. They may also be eligible to be a member. Always keep an application/brochure on you. If someone shows interest, sign your name and number on the brochure and ask for theirs - then do a follow up call in a week or two.

Let us show our communities who we are and what we do. Celebrate our rich history and show the pride we have in our organization.

The Christmas Gift Shop program provides gifts to family members of hospitalized Veterans at no cost to the Veteran. The Gift Shop Supervisor develops a catalog of items for the Veterans to choose from and volunteers wrap, box, label and ship the orders to the family members. We visited with Veterans

at the Wisconsin Veterans Home-Union Grove and had the honor of helping them choose gifts for their families. The Veterans at the facility were astonished that they were able to select items and many times asked how much they owed. We just told them this is a way the ALA is able to give back to those who gave of themselves so we enjoy our freedom today.

During our visit, I met Kathrine "Kioko" Anderson. Kioko was 12 years old when she and her brother were sitting on a hill that overlooked the naval ships moored at Pearl Harbor. The date was December 7, 1941. They watched as Pearl Harbor was being bombed. She said she and her brother didn't think much of what was going on because maneuvers had been happening during the previous weeks. Kioko said all of a sudden, she realized something was very wrong so she and her brother ran back home. As they were running, a Japanese plane was above them. The pilot tilted its wings back and forth, which is a form of saying "we are here." From that moment Kioko was determined to join the military.

Kioko wanted to become a Marine, and that she did. Knowing

that her height might be an issue, she teased up her hair and passed the height restriction! Kioko, was the first woman to enter the military from the state of Hawaii. Basic training was held in San Diego and a film crew followed her around during basic training. The family has been trying to get their hands on the film. I asked



her to let me know if they do so we can have a look. I asked Kioko if her family was sent to any of the Japanese camps known as "relocation camps." Only her state-side family members were sent to the camps.

Because of your generosity, 70 Veterans at Union Grove will have presents for their loved ones. There are other Veterans facilities that will be visited and Veterans will be able to shop for their families for Christmas as well - more Veterans to visit and many more stories to be told!

It is through your continued membership in the ALA, personal donations, and precious time working the ALA programs that makes this all possible.
