MISSION IN ACTION: BARABOO UNIT 26

BARABOO 4TH GRADERS LEARN ABOUT THE "RED POPPY"

Mary Spink, Auxiliary member of Unit 26 in Baraboo and a retired school teacher, encouraged unit members to go into the schools to present to 4th graders the significance of the "red poppy" and Memorial Day. Enthusiasm among the members grew and the goal became to make a presentation to all 4th graders, about 250 students, in the Baraboo School District by Memorial Day.

The 4th grade teachers assisted by sending home a letter asking students to write down the name of a Veteran who was no longer living and their branch of service. The unit's presentation was brief, about one-half hour. They engaged the students by passing around a WWI uniform, helmet, and backpack for a hands-on experience, quizzed the students, and enlightened them on the significance of the red poppy.

To finalize the presentation, students wrote the name of their Veteran and branch of service on a white card and glued a red paper poppy in the center. The "poppies" were collected and used to create posters. The posters were completed by Auxiliary members and taken to the schools to be displayed. Later, the unit moved the posters to downtown Baraboo business windows for display until Memorial Day. On Memorial Day, the posters were displayed at Walnut Hill Cemetery during the Memorial Day Program presented by the military organizations in Baraboo.

This is the second successful year thanks to the Baraboo Schools allowing the unit to make a presentation, members of Unit 26 who provided input to create the presentation, and members who volunteered their time and talents in the classroom! The next morning, we headed to UW-Oshkosh for ALA Badger Girls State. We got there just in time for a lunch of state fair food, including cream puffs. Lisa spoke briefly to the girls about how they could be part of *Be The One*.

CHILDREN & YOUTH HERO AWARD

An eighth-grader is being hailed as a hero after grabbing hold of the wheel of his school bus after the driver lost consciousness. His heroics earned him an American Legion Auxiliary Youth Hero Award, presented by PDP Diana Sirovina.

Acie Holland III understood something wasn't right when the driver began to appear dizzy. Soon after, her head dropped, but the bus continued to accelerate past a turn on the route. "She turned the corner and there's another street that we usually turn on. She pressed the gas and went past the corner, and I looked up," Holland said. Coming to the front, he found the driver unresponsive and the bus veering into oncoming traffic.

In what he later described as a fight or flight situation, Holland moved the driver aside, took the wheel and safely





parked the bus on the side of the road, calling 911 after it had come to a halt and telling each student to call their parents.

The driver had suffered a medical emergency. At first, Holland's father, Acie Holland II, wasn't sure if his son was telling the truth, but when it did eventually become clear, Holland Sr. said he wasn't surprised. "He's always been a person where he's real quick on his feet. That's one of my things that I know he's capable of, not on the school bus, but just in general, being able to help someone in need. I am proud of what he did," said Holland Sr.

Mr. Holland II owns a garage, and Holland III says it's around the shop that he had grown accustomed to the functions of automobiles enough to feel confident grabbing the wheel of that bus. The school said that Holland's leadership and compassion is something they witness daily, but the incident in April took it to the 'next level.'

It's "Back to School" time already, or at least time for units and members to be planning the Education program for the year. The **purpose** of the ALA Education Program is to promote quality education for children, especially military children, and adults through classroom activities, literacy programs, scholarship promotion, support of education beyond high school and the M. Louise Wilson Educational Loan Fund which provides interest-free loans to assist female members of the ALA pursuing higher education.

The ALA Education Program encourages units and members to participate and get involved in the following components which demonstrate the **relevance** of educating community youth and citizens throughout the state:

- ALA's Give 10 to Education
- American Education Week, November 18 – 22, 2024
- Month of the Military Child, April 2025
- Purple Up! Day, April 15, 2025
- Teachers Appreciation Week, May 5 9, 2025
- Veterans in Community Schools
- The American Legion Family scholarships at the national, department, and local levels
- Legislation that establishes new scholarship opportunities

For a wide variety of what can be done to

participate in any or all of these components, go to the department and national websites (www.amlegionauxwi.org and www.ALAforVeterans.org) or read the Unit Mailings which are published every other month.

Download scholarship applications when they are available and distribute them to incoming high school seniors. This will allow time for applicants to familiarize themselves with the eligibility requirements and prepare their applications for submission by March 1, 2025.

Application forms and requirements will be posted on the department website. Click on *Programs* then *Education*.

The M. LOUISE WILSON EDUCATIONAL LOAN FUND was established in 1925 to promote the ALA mission and is funded through donations. ALA members who require financial support in order to further their education can apply for interest-free loans by contacting this chairman. Applicants may attend a technical, two or four-year college/university. If approved, the applicant can borrow up to \$800 per year for five years. One year from the date of the first loan, the applicant can request an additional \$800 by sending a copy of college grades and maintaining membership in the American Legion Auxiliary. If approved, the applicant may continue to borrow annually until the amount reaches \$4,000 or they are no longer a full-time student.

This program has been successful due to The American Legion Family members providing donations and ALA applicants honoring their responsibility to repay the loan.

BE THE ONE

Suicide has impacted so many... Veterans, adults of all ages, teens, and even children. Second District President Sandy Mack invited not only the 2nd District American Legion Family but also the public. This has become a high priority in communities, schools, and families. As National Commander Dan Seehafer says, "It's Personal."

Curtiss Peck, a member of the American Association of Suicidology, presented a R.A.C.E. Suicide Prevention Program at Cedarburg Post 288. It was attended by members of the Cedarburg community, Ozaukee County Units, and 2nd District Auxiliary members. The program was very well received.

R. A. C. E. stands for:

- Recognizing signs of distress
- Asking the person about what they are thinking or feeling without judgement
- Caring for person while actively listening
- Escorting the person for help based on needs

The R.A.C.E. suicide prevention model


